## **Background Information**

The International Year of Astronomy 2009 is a global initiative of the United Nations Educational and Scientific Organization [UNESCO] and the International Astronomical Union (IAU) endorsed by the UN General Assembly to help ordinary citizens around the world rediscover their place in the universe through the day and night time sky, and in so doing engage in "personal sense of wonder and discovery." The theme for the Year, which also commemorates the 400<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Galileo's use of a telescope to study the skies, is "The Universe, Yours to Discover." The IYA2009 is expected to highlight global cooperation for peaceful purposes. For several millennia, astronomers have worked together across all boundaries including geographic, gender, age, culture and race, in line with the principles of the UN Charter. In this sense, astronomy is a classic example of how science can contribute towards international cooperation.

Science plays a crucial part in protecting and conserving the planet today and scientific research has led to remarkable innovations that have benefited humankind. Life expectancy has increased, and cures have been discovered for many diseases. In many parts of the world, agricultural output has risen significantly to meet growing population needs, and technological developments have created the opportunity to free humankind from strenuous manual labour. However, scientific progress has also led to environmental degradation and technological disasters such as the manufacturing of conventional weapons and weapons of mass destruction. Scientists today face a greater demand to use their knowledge and understanding of science in a responsible manner to address human needs and aspirations. Each of us should be aware of the impact of astronomy and basic sciences on our daily lives, and better understand how scientific knowledge can contribute to a more equitable and peaceful society. Today's Briefing is our first step to ensuring that we all better familiarize ourselves with our universe-the Sky above and the Earth below and our place in it.

We have recently secured the Simon Wiesenthal Center located at 226 East 42<sup>nd</sup> Street as a one of the alternative spaces which we will use for our Briefings. We expect to rotate this with whatever other space we can obtain from UN Conference Services. However since the venue is smaller than our previous venue we will need to implement a number of new measures to ensure that we stay within our agreement with the Wiesenthal Center. We therefore ask that you please take note of the following:

Since the Simon Wiesenthal Center only seats 80 people, we will only be able to seat NGO's on a first-come first-served basis. Each NGO will be allowed to make ONE reservation by e-mail at dpingo@un.org, up to one week before the Briefing but not less than two days prior to the Briefing. The name of the NGO will then be placed on a list, and those on the list will be able to access the Simon Wiesenthal Center with their annual UN Grounds Pass. We will not be able to accommodate guests on those occasions.
